The Oklahoma Caring Foundation serves communities beyond the Oklahoma City and Tulsa regions through relationships with tribal partners. In 2022, the foundation celebrated its 10-year partnership with the Choctaw Nation Health Services Authority. Since 2012, the Choctaw Nation Caring Van has provided more than 17,000 children and nearly 12,000 adults with more than 33,000 immunizations.



The Oklahoma Caring Foundation launched a new partnership with Variety Care to operate the Caring Vans serving the OKC Metro Area in 2022.
